## **TALIBAN'S EXTREMIST IMPLEMENTATION OF SHARIA LAW-**

- The Taliban have outlawed singing, dancing, and educating girls beyond primary school under their strict interpretation of Sharia law. - 2. Arrests, fines, and physical punishments for LGBTQ people continue to occur around the world in 2021, according to a new report. The death penalty is also likely to be enforced, though the report notes that documentation of such instances remains difficult. ## HUMAN RIGHTS UNDER TALIBAN

- 1. The humanitarian crisis jeopardises fundamental human rights. In a briefing to the UN Human Rights Council, Nada Al-Nashif described how Afghanistan's deep humanitarian crisis is jeopardising basic rights, disproportionately affecting women, girls, and civil society. <u>https://news.un.org/en/story/2021/12/1107902</u>
- 2. Afghanistan's deposed envoy laments a "complete reversal" of rights gains. - 3. US advocates decry 'impunity and secrecy' in the Kabul drone attack. Activists demand increased oversight after the Pentagon decides not to punish army officials for the bombing that killed ten people. - 2. Since the Taliban took over in August, the country's economy is estimated to have shrunk by 40%. In the midst of the Afghan financial crisis, the United States must reconsider its punitive sanctions policy.
