HUMAN RIGHTS UNDER TALIBAN

2. On International Women's Day in early March, Secretary of State Antony Blinken stood at a lectern against a backdrop of silvery drapes and somberly rattled off a list of Afghan women leaders killed by the Taliban or other terrorist groups. The Biden Administration has abandoned these women to the Taliban after placing a target on their backs. This grotesque moral cowardice is exactly what occurs when the Biden administration views the disaster in Afghanistan as a public relations disaster rather than a life-or-death situation for those left behind.

3. The UN has issued a warning about killings and a "total reversal" of rights in Afghanistan under Taliban rule. According to the New York-based watchdog, the Taliban has "summarily executed or forcibly disappeared" more than 100 former security force members in just four of Afghanistan's 34 provinces. Nashif expressed grave concern about the "continued risk of child recruitment" by the Islamic State's local affiliate as well as the Taliban, with "boys increasingly visible among security forces at checkpoints, as bodyguards, and in combat roles."

While the Canadian government was able to evacuate more than 3,700 people from Kabul, retired major-general David Fraser, who commanded more than 2,000 NATO coalition troops during Operation Medusa in the Afghan province of Kandahar in 2006, believes the number should have been "a hell of a lot higher." - 18. Since 2020, Afghanistan has reported 4,698 confirmed cases and 96 related deaths among healthcare workers (HCWs). Herat, Kabul, Nangarhar, Balkh, and Kunar have reported the highest number of positive cases among HCWs to date. Since February 2020, 157,634 confirmed cases (overall percent positivity 32.3) of COVID-19 have been reported in Afghanistan, with 7,328 associated deaths (CFR=4.6 percent). The country lacks the capacity to test for variants (Omicron), and plans are in the works to send the

- 19. Flights to and from Kabul were delayed or cancelled on Thursday (Dec 16) after the city was blanketed in snow overnight. Kabul's streets were also mostly deserted as shop owners, government employees, and workers sought refuge indoors from the bitter cold.
