The posters were placed in Kabul by the Taliban-led government's Ministry for the Promotion of Virtue and Prevention of Vice to advise and encourage women to cover themselves in public.

Christian leaders in Pakistan are sceptical that the country's first-ever digital census would accurately tally the country's Christian minority, according to the Union of Catholic Asian News (UCAN). Previous censuses, according to these leaders, undercounted Christians, denying Christians due representation in the country's

political and social systems. "It is not right if the government demands us to share the information," Bishop Samson Shukardin told UCAN of sharing parish records with local governments for the digital census. It must inspire trust in us in order to protect the data. There must be a procedure in place. All of this raises a lot of questions for us."

4. An extremist who attempted to cross the Syrian border from Turkey to join a terrorist training camp for months has been sentenced to 12 years in prison in the United Kingdom. Mamun Rashid, a 28-year-old East Londoner, was apprehended by Turkish officials in February 2019 within walking distance of the Syrian border in the north. He'd spent six months planning his crossing of the border after flying from London to Istanbul with the goal of becoming a martyr. Rashid was deported to the United Kingdom, where he pled guilty to planning terrorist actions and was sentenced to prison on Thursday.

5. A local official announced on Monday that Iraqi authorities have deported 111 Iraqi families related to the Islamic State group from a Kurdish-run camp in northern Syria. They arrived on Saturday and were taken to Al-Jadaa camp in Nineveh province, south of Mosul, according to the official who did not want to be identified. At least 339 IS-affiliated families have been relocated from Al-Hol camp in northeast Syria to Al-Jadaa, which houses around 7,500 internally displaced persons, since May 2021. According to Iraqi authorities, they include relatives of jihadists, some of them are from other parts of Iraq, including the provinces of Salaheddine and Ramadi.

6. The government is expected to release plans for new counter-terrorism legislation known as "Martyn's Law" on Monday. Venues would be required by law to offer precise security preparations in the event of a terrorist attack, according to the recommendations. Owners of venues and places, both private and public, are now under no obligation to act on free advice from experienced counter-terrorism advisers regarding terrorist dangers and how to lessen the risk.

According to a statement released by the Iraqi Ministry of Defense, the Sulaimaniyah Intelligence and Security Directorate, which is affiliated with the Iraqi Ministry of Defense's General Directorate of Intelligence and Security, was able to apprehend four members of the ISIL terrorist group in Sulaimaniyah. These ISIL militants were caught in an operation coordinated with the Sulaymaniyah Intelligence Office and prosecuted under Article 4 of the Anti-Terrorism Law. The Iraqi Ministry of Defense stressed that legal action has been taken against these terrorists, and that the mission to apprehend the wanted individuals will continue, according to the statement.
