# European Council agenda prioritises Ukraine and Russia assets



The Council's forward look placed Ukraine support, frozen Russian assets, and EU defence integration at the heart of September's agenda. Officials highlighted debates on repurposing Russian reserves, deepening defence cooperation, and maintaining unity. This schedule underscored Europe's enduring external challenges and institutional efforts to preserve strategic credibility. ( 2.9.25 )

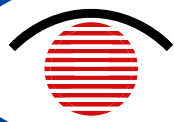

# Poland warns EU over “agricultural Nord Stream 2” deal



Former Polish agriculture minister likened the EU–Mercosur trade agreement to a food-security “pipeline,” warning it could undermine European farmers by creating dangerous dependency and destabilising agricultural governance across the bloc. ( 5.9.25 )



# Calls for sanctions assessment gain

## ground

Lawyers and advocacy networks submitted formal requests that EU institutions legally assess sanctions under European law. Their appeal increased pressure on Brussels to translate political concerns into enforceable measures. It demonstrated growing reliance on legal tools within governance to address international crises, beyond political rhetoric ( 8.9.25)



# Diplomatic outreach intensifies across capitals

EU ambassadors engaged foreign ministries across member states, debating collective responses to Gaza. National differences complicated prospects for unity, but consultations underscored determination to maintain engagement. This diplomacy revealed governance under strain, balancing competing domestic positions with expectations for credible European international action in volatile conflicts. (9.9.25)



## Von der Leyen declares Europe's "independence moment" in State of the Union



In her address, the EU Commission President called for bold EU self-reliance amid rising global threats. She pledged stronger support for Ukraine, new sanctions on Russia, and steps to assert Europe's role in trade and security.

# Parliament adopts Gaza resolution

The European Parliament voted overwhelmingly for a resolution demanding ceasefire, aid access, and hostages' release. While symbolic, it strengthened pressure on the Council and Commission. It reinforced parliamentary activism in foreign policy, showing how governance institutions shape the EU's external image during international crises.

# Member states divided on Israel response

# NATO and EU watch Russian drills closely

Massive Russia-Belarus military exercises heightened NATO and EU fears about Eastern Europe's stability. Observers warned of Moscow-Minsk integration deepening. This reinforced calls for stronger border defences, reflecting governance demands to align EU foreign, security, and defence policies more effectively in light of persistent external threats. # Legal avenues explored in Brussels



EU lawyers considered steps short of full sanctions to address potential international-law violations by Israel. Officials examined compliance frameworks and external legal precedents. # Commission reviews external cooperation funds



Brussels pledged tighter oversight on external migration-related spending after criticism. Officials admitted governance gaps allowed funds to risk benefiting authoritarian partners.
