# Lobga Rangzen's Self-Immolation Sparks Global Tibetan Mobilisation

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Following Tibetan activist Lobga Rangzen's self-immolation outside UN Headquarters in July, worldwide solidarity events unfolded through August vigils, head-shaving protests, hunger strikes, and marches in New York, Dharamshala, Zurich, Canberra, Taipei and beyond turning his death into a rallying point against Beijing's Ethnic Unity Law.



# Tibetan Parliament-in-Exile Launches Campaign Against China's Ethnic Unity Law

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The Tibetan Parliament-in-Exile issued repeated open letters and appeals urging the UN, world governments and rights bodies to scrutinise China's new Ethnic Unity and Progress Law, calling it a tool of forced assimilation threatening Tibetan language, religion, culture, and identity, including troubling surveillance provisions under Article 54.



# Larung Gar Demolition Campaign Intensifies

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Satellite imagery and eyewitness reports confirmed an expanding demolition drive at Larung Gar Buddhist Academy, targeting roughly 1,060 monastic residences. Reports described tightened security, visitor tracking, movement restrictions, and the detention of a monk who displayed a Panchen Lama photo, deepening concerns over religious repression.



# Chinese Geologists Warn of Seismic Risk Beneath Yarlung Tsangpo Mega-Dam

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Chinese geologists flagged the Paizhen active fault and earthquake-prone terrain under the planned 60,000-MW Yarlung Tsangpo hydropower project. Experts called for independent safety audits and real-time hydrological data sharing, citing catastrophic risks for Tibet and downstream India and Bangladesh if construction proceeds without transparency.



# Devastating Nepal-Tibet Border Floods Expose China's Information Opacity

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A glacier-related collapse triggered flash floods along the Rasuwa-Kyirong border, killing dozens in Nepal and leaving hundreds missing on the Tibetan side. Beijing was accused of delayed warnings, censored footage, and restricted access for journalists and search parties, fuelling criticism over transparency and disaster accountability.



# India-China Hold High-Level Border Talks, Reach Eight-Point Consensus

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NSA Ajit Doval and Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi discussed boundary stability, agreeing on new military hotlines, additional commander-level meeting points, and a push toward "early harvest" delimitation in less-disputed sectors like Sikkim, though core territorial disputes remain unresolved and require careful monitoring.



# India Bolsters Border Infrastructure to Counter China's Tibet Build-Up

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India assigned the Border Roads Organisation to build a strategic 157-km road near Shipki La and revived the Chalsa-Naxalbari rail project toward Doklam, responding to China's continued construction of roads, camps and observation posts across the Tibetan frontier and strengthening India's logistics and deterrence capacity.



# China Develops High-Altitude Drone Hub Near Indian Border

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Reports indicate China is building a drone research and testing centre in Tibet near the Indian frontier for surveillance, logistics and patrol operations in Himalayan conditions, which alongside reported J-20 fighter deployments in Lhasa signals continued military modernisation of the Tibetan Plateau.



# US Senate Introduces "Assuring the Future of Tibet Act"

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Senators Jeff Merkley and Jim Risch introduced legislation to strengthen US engagement with the Central Tibetan Administration's elected leadership and expand Tibetan representation in international forums including the UN, reinforcing Washington's institutional support for Tibet's governance-in-exile.



# Tibetan Youth Congress Hunger Strike Passes 19 Days

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The Tibetan Youth Congress's global chain hunger strike against the Ethnic Unity Law reached its 19th day, joined by parliamentarians in Dharamshala and over 40 TYC chapters across seven countries, alongside the launch of "FactGuard Tibet" to counter Chinese disinformation.



# Beijing-Appointed Panchen Lama Pushed to Advance Sinicisation

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China's TAR Party Secretary instructed state-appointed Panchen Lama Gyaltzen Norbu to promote Party loyalty and Sinicisation of Tibetan Buddhism; Norbu later linked the Ethnic Unity Law to "true Dharma," while the Dalai Lama-recognised Panchen Lama remains missing, underscoring Beijing's religious-control strategy.



# **Detained Monk Left Critically Ill After Derge Dam Protest**

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Tibetan monk Gonpo Tsering, held after protesting the Derge hydropower project, was reportedly left in critical condition following alleged torture in custody, with rights groups condemning denial of medical access as the project continues to threaten monasteries and sacred sites.



# China Unveils 27,000-km "Golden Highway Loop" and Border Ring Road

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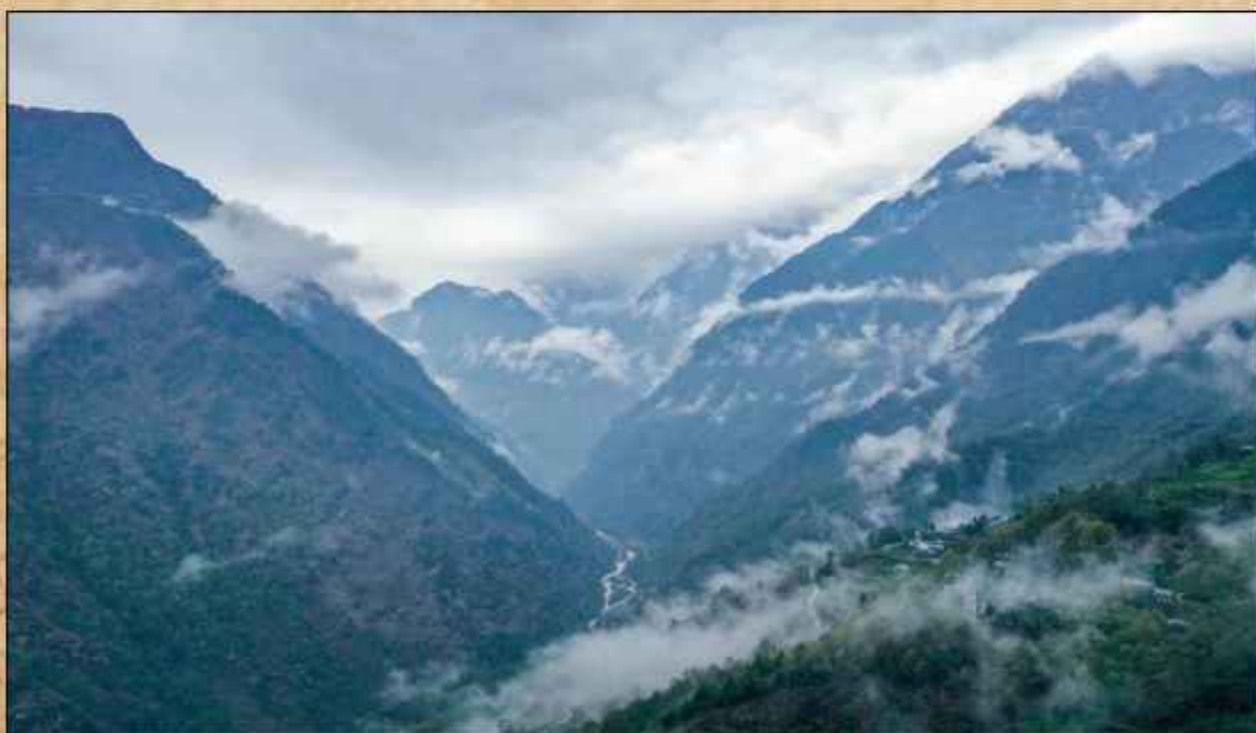
Beijing announced a vast border-and-coastal highway network across the Tibetan Plateau, including G219 stretches through disputed territory. Analysts warn the project, framed as tourism and development, could expand surveillance, resource extraction, and military logistics while reinforcing China's territorial claims.



# India Renames Arunachal Locations, China Reasserts "Zangnan" Claim

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India's Survey of India standardised names for 27 Arunachal Pradesh locations, countering China's repeated renaming exercises; Beijing responded by reasserting its "South Tibet" claim, keeping cartographic disputes central to the unresolved India-China border question.



# Report Finds Tibetans Hold Only 62 of 240 Senior Positions in Tibet

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A leadership assessment ahead of China's 21st Party Congress found Tibetan representation in Party, security and military roles remains minimal despite Beijing's claims of regional autonomy, pointing to intensifying centralised control over Tibetan governance.



# Nathu La Pass Reopens After Six Years, Signalling Limited Thaw

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The reopening of Nathu La enabled resumed pilgrimage and border trade between India and China, though analysts caution this reflects only limited practical improvement given unresolved border disputes and continued strategic mistrust between the two sides.



# **Amnesty International Demands Release of Activist Held Over Dalai Lama Photo**

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Amnesty International called for the release of Han Chinese activist Zhang Yi, charged with "inciting separatism" after showing a Dalai Lama photograph to a Tibetan woman at Sera Monastery, highlighting Beijing's severe restrictions on religious expression.



# Lawmakers in Australia and Belgium Raise Alarm Over Transnational Repression

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Australian Senator Dean Smith called for Magnitsky-style sanctions over alleged Chinese surveillance of Tibetan-Australians, while Belgium's Parliament separately discussed the Ethnic Unity Law's risks to diaspora communities abroad, reflecting growing Western legislative scrutiny of Beijing's extraterritorial reach.





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
